

DARAGONERY EARANGES

These earrings were some of the very first I made and sold way back in 1993 at my first art fair. They're easy and quick so make wonderful gifts.

Thank you for purchasing this tutorial! Before you get to work, please take the time to read the tutorial thoroughly.

It's a bit like a complicated recipe; you want to have all of your ingredients ready before you start! This tutorial is intended for beadweavers who are just beginning their beading journey. Threading a needle is all you need to know!

The design for this piece is based off of ancient techniques. The design itself, however, is mine.

Materials Needed:

Earwires

1 gram 8/0 Toho Demirounds

1 gram 8/0 Toho Round Seed Beads

1 gram 11/0 Toho Round Seed Beads

2-hole Daggers (5x16m) (10)

4mm rounds (20)
Beading Thread
(Fireline or similar recommended)

Beading Needles



Lets Get Going!-----

Cut 1 yard of thread. Thread it on a needle and tie cut ends together so you have a doubled thread. You may want to put a dot of glue or nail polish onto your knot. Make sure it is totally dry before the next step.

Tie onto a 8/0 demiround. I usually tie it on so the knot is just below the demiround. This way, it can be hidden inside the next bead we add.



Pass 2: See photo to the right. Outer circle Go through

1x 4mm round 1x demiround 1x 8/0 round

3x 11/0 round

1x 8/0 round

Add 1xdemiround 1x4mm round

Go through the bottom hole of the dagger

(you added this in the previous step)

Add 1x8/0 round

Go through the bottom hole of the dagger

(you added this in the previous step)

Add 1x 4mm round

1x demiround

1x 8/0 round

2 x 11/0 round

1x 8/0 round

1xdemiround

3 x 11/0 round

Go through the top hole of a dagger

Add 1x8/0 round

1x11/0 round

1x8/0 round

Go through the bottom hole of the dagger

Add 1x8/0 round

1x11/0 round

1x8/0 round

Go through the top hole of the dagger

Add 2x11/0 round seed beads

Go through

1x 11/0 round

1x 8/0 round

1xdemiround

1x4mm round

Mirror the first side of this outer ring to complete the dragonfly earring.

Follow the thread path a few times to make sure that your beadwork is tight and stiff. I try to go through each of the loops (passes) at least one more time. This is why you want to use Fireline – otherwise the beadwork gets floppy. Cut off excess thread.

Attach your top demirounds to the earwires Wear and Enjoy!
